SUMMARY

Lufthansa pilots strike paralyzes Frankfurt Airport. Markets decline on Mideast tensions. No major security incidents.

AVIATION

Vereinigung Cockpit launched a strike March 12--13 over pension and pay disputes, causing mass cancellations at Frankfurt Airport. Up to 90% of mainline and cargo flights grounded. Hundreds stranded, with disruptions rippling to Munich and Brussels. FRA cargo volumes had risen 4.8% in February despite prior weather and strike hits, but the current action exacerbates delays. Source reliability A.

POLITICS

No political developments in Frankfurt or Hesse. National Forsa poll shows CDU/CSU at 26%, AfD at 24%, signaling far-right gains but no local tie-in

in the last 24 hours. Local media silent on protests or elections. Source reliability B.

SECURITY

Situation stable. No terrorism, crime, or protest incidents in Frankfurt or Hesse March 12--13.

General EU terror threat elevated per Europol amid Mideast conflict, but no Frankfurt-specific plots. Armed Polizei visible at FRA. One rail delay near Höchst due to unspecified incident on the Wiesbaden line. Source reliability C for social media reports.

MARKETS

DAX fell 1.17% to 23,313 on March 13, driven by Mideast oil surge and inflation fears. European shares down further March 12. National CPI inflation at 1.9% for February. ECB data release scheduled March 13, no Frankfurt impact noted. Source reliability A.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Heavily impacted by FRA strike. No rail or power outages beyond minor S-Bahn delay to Wiesbaden. Prior public transport strikes in early March resolved. Snow disruptions from March 5 have faded. Source reliability A.

INCIDENTS

No notable accidents, fires, or crimes reported in Frankfurt or Hesse in the last 24 hours. Source reliability A.

ASSESSMENT

Strike cripples Frankfurt's role as EU air gateway and logistics node, amplifying economic drag from global tensions. No escalation risk evident, but prolonged action could strain Hesse's economy.
